On behalf of the Foxridge Improvement Association Board, I would like to wish you a Happy New Year. We look forward to planning events and services for 2022 and want to invite you to pay your \$50 annual dues right away to help in our planning.

How does FIA membership work?

- FIA \$50 annual dues are voluntary. Without duespaying members, the FIA would cease to exist.
- In 2021, 407 out of 935 properties joined. Even though that is only 44% of our residents, it represents the highest membership in many years.
- The dues received pay for all the events, services, and operations of the FIA. Board members are volunteers; the only salary paid goes to the covenant advisor.

Our current email list includes residents from the past few years who have joined and provided email addresses. The list is outdated, and we plan to update it through membership sign-ups this year. Members can opt to provide more than one email address to include other family members. They can also opt out of being included on the list, if they'd like.

The list is used to provide information about upcoming events and is not released to others.

While the FIA has a healthy reserve, expenditures have exceeded income over the last few years. This situation is not sustainable, so increasing membership is important to continue our current operations/events and enable us to potentially add new.






Foxridge Community Garden

Our dry fall weather and impending winter weather means our trees and shrubs need some watering help from us. The following article from Denver Water gives some valuable tips.



Winter watering tips for trees, shrubs

Trees and shrubs need a little extra water to get through fall and winter's dry spells.



Winter in Denver includes snow and cold, but long dry stretches and warm temperatures are not unusual.

During those times, your trees and shrubs need a helping hand from you — especially since this fall has been one of the driest in Colorado history.

"The occasional hand-watering of trees and shrubs in the winter is helpful. A few gallons go a long way this time of year," said Jeff Tejral, water efficiency manager at Denver Water.

Watering during dry stretches, when there's been no significant precipitation for about three weeks, will prevent root damage that affects the health of the entire plant. Apply the water at the "drip line," the area at the outer edge of the plant's branches, so that it reaches the roots.

A 3-week dry spell means

- Trees: Need about 10 gallons of water for each inch of the tree trunk's diameter.
- Shrubs: Need between 5 and 18 gallons of water.

Water only when temperatures are above 40 F with no snow on the ground. Frozen soil won't absorb water.

Keep moisture in the ground by putting mulch under the plant's branches, leaving a few inches of space around the trunk of the tree or base of the plant.

The Wine Press

Resolution January. A month that gives you a fresh start or a stab at something you may want to improve. Usually it's along the lines of being fitter and healthier. For the wine inclined, how about becoming a better taster. How do you become a better taster? Well, for starters a helpful tool is the Wine Aroma Wheel from UC Davis. You can print off a copy or look it up on the Internet and next time you are tasting a wine you can use it to help you identify what you are smelling. By doing so, you will come to recognize what you like about your favorite wines and learn some fault characteristics to tell you if the wine has gone off.

Wine Aroma Wheel from UC Davis

The wheel is too large for me to download here, but essentially the wine wheel lets you go from a broad classification to a specific classification. For an example, if you are smelling fruit aromas you can narrow that to tree fruit, to cherry, to black cherry. This would be wines like Pinot Noir, which tend to have those cherry aromas.

Most wine will have basic aromas like fruit, spice, or floral. Very good wine that is aged or of superior quality give a secondary aroma profile that is more layered and complex. Being a sommelier, I think the most important task is to be able to spot a quality wine. It seems sometimes strange to like characteristics such as wet pavement, cigar box, smoke and truffle. Those aromas are tucked in among layers of spice and fruit and are like finding little surprises. As the wine opens up you might get a completely different nose. These wines are rare wines and they are what delight me so!

How to spot a fault

A fault in a wine is a manufacturing problem with the cork/seal. It can also be a storage problem. Some smells should not be in wine and that includes wet dog, moldy cellar, sherry (unless it's a sherry), yeasty. Horsey animal scents are usually a bad thing. Originally that was why you are always presented with a little wine in the glass and the wine cork to see if the wine has spoiled. The "snobbish" ceremony is actually quite practical. No need to taste it. Give it a swirl, your nose will tell you if there is a fault.

Typical wine aromas from certain varietals

Cab Sauv-pencil shavings

Pinot Noir - Cherry/Violet

Cabernet Franc-herbaceous

Riesling-Peach honey

Sauvignon Blanc cat pee, sorry, but its true of New Zealand especially. Sometimes from a sulphur compound found in the wine as it ages

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
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
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January Landscape Update:

Your GID Funds at Work

Landscape Maintenance/Entry Gardens: SuttonScapes hired local teens, many from our list in *Foxtales*, to help with fall cleanup along Quebec and Mineral. They worked hard and did a great job! Work was finished in early December.

Power at Mineral/Quebec: The power apparatus on the property at the south side of Mineral and Quebec has been moved outside the new fence. SuttonScapes collaborated with Sturgeon Electric to do the work...a big project that involved a lot of trench digging. We are waiting for the Xcel Energy inspection which will be followed by an invoice from Sturgeon.

Fence Damage along Quebec from Car Crash: Fortunately, nobody was injured in the car crash on Friday morning, December 10th when the streets were icy. A driver heading north on Quebec just south of the creek put on her brakes when the car in front started sliding. She then veered across the lanes, over the sidewalk, and through the fence, stopping in a back yard. There was significant damage to the retaining wall and the fence, including a broken post and two destroyed panels. SuttonScapes was able to fix the retaining wall fairly quickly and the Split Rail Fence company was hired to repair the fence. Driver insurance should cover the cost of the damage.

Pollan Signature Salad

Note: Michael Pollan is one of my favorite authors and his family has published a couple of cookbooks. This salad is always a hit!

Salad

- 5-7 ounces mixed baby greens
- ½ cup chopped candied walnuts (homemade* or storebought)
- 1 Bosc pear, cored and thinly sliced lengthwise
- 1/3 cup shaved Parmesan cheese

Dressing

- 1/3 cup white balsamic vinegar
- 1 tablespoon raspberry vinegar, champagne vinegar or sherry vinegar
- 1½ teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1/3 cup grapeseed oil
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- Sea salt & freshly ground black pepper

Place the greens in a large salad bowl. Pour on half the dressing and toss. Add the walnuts, pear, and more dressing (taking care not to overdress) and toss again. Top with the cheese shavings and serve.

*Candied walnuts: Heat 1 cup raw walnuts & 3 tablespoons granulated sugar, while stirring, in a nonstick skillet until sugar turns caramel brown and nuts are toasted. Cool on wax or parchment paper, then break apart and chop.





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
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
