Enthusiasm and Optimism in 2022!

There was a strong sense of enthusiasm and optimism at the first Foxridge Improvement Association Board meeting of 2022 on January 12th. The creativity and talent of new members became evident during our 9-member board meeting, even through a Zoom format. Such a pleasure to see cohesion and a sense of purpose in our neighborhood in a world where things sometimes feel out of control.

Enthusiasm

Enthusiasm was very evident as we discussed plans for 2022. Besides continuing our regular services and activities, we hope to add a couple of events we haven't held in a while. Here's how the calendar is shaping up so far:

Optimism

Our optimism was evident as we discussed our hopes that residents of Foxridge would help us meet the challenge of increasing our membership in 2022. This activity list is only possible with funding that can support it. The board voted unanimously to approve a budget that projects a roughly \$4,000 deficit based on 2021 memberships. That is only possible because of a healthy reserve. This reserve is dwindling, however, so this scenario is not sustainable. We are optimistic that we can attract over 90 new members that will cover that deficit. If not, we will have to cut programs for next year or perhaps increase the voluntary dues. Much better to raise membership numbers so more people are supporting our services rather than relying on more money from those who typically join.



Membership Numbers...and 2022 Membership Goal

Last year, 407 households out of 934 paid their \$50 dues – one more than 2020. That's 44%. Around 380 people joined in 2018 and 2019, so things are definitely on the upswing. Our goal for 2022 is 500 members – a number that would allow us to operate in the black and preserve our services and programs into the future.

We have a pretty good start! As of January 18th, our press deadline, we had 92 Members; last year at that time - around 50 members. Feel free to check the website at

Courts Survey Information

For many years, the Club's Board Members have looked to repair/replace the dilapidated tennis courts, but raising the substantial capital necessary to do so has been a challenge. After unsuccessful efforts to raise funds to build tennis courts, several members suggested that pickleball may be a new offering that could drive new interest, increase membership and possibly attract additional funding sources. Because a vast majority of the Club's income comes from Membership Dues, it is important to know whether a new pickleball offering and/or revived tennis courts would attract new members, additional revenue and possibly donors.

Since we have been unable to raise the \$300,000+ (for any courts, tennis, pickleball or combination of both) necessary to rebuild the courts, we were all ears to hear what we needed to do to determine if there was funding for us to take care of that space. With the advice of a resident who has experience raising capital for neighborhood court projects, we decided to launch a survey as a way to gauge interest levels and determine whether these ideas would be worthwhile pursuits. Because the Club permits members to join from outside the neighborhood, we sent the survey to surrounding areas as well, and asked you to help us forward to friends and family in the area to help us learn about broader interests.

Here are some of the results of the survey:

- 208 Responses received
- 111 Current Members responded and 97 non-members
- 72 respondents (35%) said that Pickleball courts would encourage them to join the Club
- 99 Respondents (48%) ranked their interest in tennis as a 4 or 5 (on a scale of 1-5)
 - Average overall ranking for tennis interest (on a scale of 1-5) = 3.11
- 64 Respondents (30%) ranked their interest in Pickleball as a 4 or 5 (on a scale of 1-5)
 - Average overall ranking for pickleball interest (on a scale of 1-5) = 2.61
- 117 Respondents (56%) said they would play pickleball if built
- 121 Respondents (58%) said they would play tennis if a tennis court were there
- 27 Respondents said they would donate for Pickleball Only courts
- 34 Respondents said they would donate for Tennis Only courts
- 34 Respondents said they would donate something for Pickleball courts with One Tennis Court



We also had suggestions of making mixed use courts to include basketball. We saw suggestions for a dog park, hot tub, club house, grassy playground, additional parking, volleyball, hang out area with BBQ and area for social gatherings.

The amount respondents were willing to contribute to the project varied based on preference for Tennis or Pickleball, or both, but it appears that there are members of our community that want to support an improvement. With these responses, and the understanding of a \$300,000 price tag to make any improvements, we are still in the process of considering all options.

As we process all of these, and move toward costs of each and funding sources, we will stay in communication with current members on the future of the space.

The Wine Press

Does anyone else have a headache these days? Lots of things can cause them but when you get them from wine.... well, what's up with that? If you already have allergies, I will take a gander that you also have trouble drinking reds. So, Let's examine this top 10 question about wine from consumers. Why do I get a headache when I drink wine? Warning: Polishing off a bottle will also give you a headache.

Shared allergens found in both White and Red:

Yeast: Yeast is used to convert the natural sugars in grape juice into alcohol. It is highly unlikely this is your source of headaches since during fermentation enough heat is produced to break down the allergens and therefore what's actually left are minuscule amounts. Winemakers do make wines that are unfiltered and unfined leaving behind a cloudy wine with floating dead yeast cells. If you do have a yeast allergy, these wines might be avoided.

Alcohol (Ethanol) Some people are allergic to alcohol but again it's rare. Some people have an intolerance to alcohol, giving you symptoms as mild as a flushed face to stomach cramps.

Sulfites (sulphur-based-salts) This is probably the root of your problem if you get headaches with white wine. Sulfites are naturally occurring in all kinds of food like pickles and dried fruit and wine is no different. Sulfites are a by-product of fermentation, but winemakers can use sulfites before or after fermentation. Think about it as hand sanitizer for wine, it's just good hygiene. Bulk wine and cheaper wine need more stabilizing to prevent oxidation and spoilage than high quality wine. They can contain

up to 400 parts per million. Organic wines can't add additional sulfites and will be somewhere between 30 parts per million or less. Higher quality is somewhere in between at 30-100parts per million. With this said if you are sensitive to sulfites and drinking, let's say a box wine, look for an organic or higher quality and see if this makes a difference.

Red Wine gives me headaches

Red wine has all the same allergens above but with the added allergen histamine. This causes the problem for people. When fermenting red grapes, you leave the skins on for the color and tannin and for white grapes, the juice is separated from the skin during fermentation. Since histamine is located in the skins of grapes this only happens with red wine. Histamine may be the culprit to your headache woes. Can you take an anti-histamine before drinking red wine? No clue, I am not a doctor so I can't advise on that!

FIA Board of Directors Meeting, January 12, 2022 DRAFT Minutes of the Virtual Meeting





Living roofs are just what they sound like – rooftops with vegetation. A more common name for living roofs is green roofs. No matter what you call them, most people instantly picture a high-tech, verdant city. Ironically, living roofs are not just futuristic but have a long history, even in Colorado. As we know from history books, sod houses used to dot the eastern plains and most of them had vegetation growing on top of the sod bricks used to make the structures. Living roofs are mentioned in ancient history, too, in the form of the fabled Hanging Gardens of Babylon.

The benefits of living roofs include all of the benefits of open space and gardens alike (managing stormwater, mitigating urban heat islands, supplying pollinator resources, providing green space, etc.) except that they are elevated. Many scientists view living roofs as a way to replace the ecosystem services of land that is paved over when cities are built. In other words, living roofs are a way to reclaim some of that space for nature.

While the concept of living roofs is intuitive to grasp, the design and installation of them are not as simple as they sound. 'Recreating' builtup green spaces like living roofs is challenging due to the upfront cost and weight loading on buildings. However, when designed specifically for new buildings, compared to retrofits on existing buildings, these factors become less of a challenge.

Few in Colorado have the specialized training and experience required to create a successful living roof. However, I am lucky enough to have spent the last 15+ years studying and consulting on green roof systems in Colorado. As an assistant professor at Colorado State University in the Department of Horticulture and Landscape Architecture with the specialty of living roofs, I am often involved with these projects throughout the state. Also, as a technical advisor for the City of Denver's Green Building Ordinance, I get a 'front row seat' for projects and policies related to living roofs in our metro area.

The Foxridge Community Garden organization is interested in putting my expertise to use right here in our neighborhood. (Yes, we are Foxridge residents even though I work for CSU – I teach 100% online and have most of my research here in the Denver area). We hope to receive funding to install a living roof on a tool shed in the community garden area adjacent to the Foxridge Pool. We have already submitted one grant proposal on this concept. Please help us look for funding opportunities so we can make this vision a reality.

Disaster Preparation Steps

As you may have imagined, we are receiving a lot of questions about wildfire with Boulder's suburban conflagration and its historical hurricane force winds. We often talk about mitigation, but there are also often overlooked steps to prepare for ANY emergency. Below are some often overlooked disaster preparation steps. Also, linked are some resources to prepare for wildfires for yourself and some of your younger household members.

Some often forgotten important steps:

- Reverse 911 Emergency Notification: Many do not realize that your phones have to be opted into the notification system. https://ace911.colorado.gov/arapalert
- You don't just need 2 ways out of your home. You also need 2 ways out of your neighborhood. Many times, people are not aware of secondary routes.
- Do you have a go-bag of essentials ready?
- Have you walked your home with your video camera to document what is inside your home for insurance?
- Do you have duplicate copies of important papers at a secondary trusted location?

<u>Brennan's Bananas Foster</u>

Ingredients

- 4 medium-sized bananas
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter
- 1 cup packed light brown sugar
- Dash of ground cinnamon
- ¼ cup banana liquor
- ¹/₂ cup rum
- Vanilla ice cream

Directions

- 1. Cut bananas in half crosswise, then lengthwise. Melt butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add brown sugar, and cook, stirring constantly, 2 minutes.
- 2. Add bananas to skillet, and sprinkle with cinnamon. Remove skillet from heat. Stir in liqueur and rum, and carefully ignite the fumes just above mixture with a long match. Let flames die down.
- 3. Return to heat and cook 3 to 4 minutes or until soft. Serve over ice cream.
